2021 was a historic year for OneAZ. In October, we celebrated our 70th anniversary, a milestone that many institutions aspire to reach. Our longevity isn't a secret. We're here because of our members and their voices. When we launched in 1951, we were a small group of employees from the State of Arizona who wanted a voice in how their money was managed. For 10 years we didn't have a single branch location, only a tiny office space and a crew of early associates who wanted to serve their fellow state employees with secure and low-cost banking solutions. Their dedication to protecting members' financial well-being is what has sustained us through times of struggle and times of abundance.

We reflected on our 70 years of service this past fall with immense gratitude for each of our members. October was a celebration of your trust in us as your preferred financial institution. Our branches hosted a fun week of giveaways and prizes. It's fitting that as we celebrated that milestone, we also had record growth. In 2021, nearly 20,000 new members joined OneAZ, a 25% increase when compared to 2020, and we are proud to now serve over 150,000 members. More Arizonans are joining the Credit Union Movement because they understand that their community credit union provides them with a positive experience that they won't get from a big national bank.

At OneAZ, our associates take the time to listen to you. Your voice has been so important as we grow and expand the ways in which we can help you have the most hands-on and user-friendly experience possible. This past year, you told us you wanted more options

when it came to online and mobile banking. Over the summer, we brought you Next Level Banking with enhanced features that truly let you do your banking when, where and how you choose. We then brought the same upgraded online and mobile banking experience to our business members. These were big upgrades, and we are so grateful for your patience as we transitioned.

Last year, we also expanded our ability to accept new loan applications by phone. You can now apply for a new mortgage or auto loan anytime, day or night, weekday or weekend. Member Stories

Mahalo Made

Lastassia “Lady La” Eidson has worn many hats in her career. She’s been a local radio star and a podcaster, and her latest venture has been as a small business owner. La launched Mahalo Made in 2017, serving her Hawaiian-style shave ice from a refurbished Airstream.

Her artful and delicious treats quickly gained a loyal following, with fans literally trailing her Airstream and lining up for shave ice. Last year, La decided to set down roots, putting the Airstream in park and opening her first brick and mortar storefront. Mahalo Made now calls The Frederick in Central Phoenix home.

“Working out of the trailer was much more difficult,” La said. “Here we get to unlock the door and come right in, and everything’s set up and waiting for us. Also, just what it means to have a home and a pair of keys.”

La’s connection with OneAZ Credit Union goes back over 20 years. When she was just 13 years old, her family opened her first banking account with OneAZ, and she’s been a loyal member ever since. Because of her longtime connection to the credit union, La knew

all about OneAZ’s efforts to support local businesses throughout the state. She looked for that type of support when opening her own business and turned to OneAZ for all her business banking needs. “The way that OneAZ has stepped up for me as a local business and local business owner, you really can’t pay for that kind of partnership,” she said.

Phoenicians still can’t get enough of La’s shave ice. Visit Mahalo Made on any day of the week and you’ll find a line out the door. Even in the hot summer months of August and September, people didn’t mind sweating it out for a chance to cool down with these chilly and tasty treats. In fact, it’s not uncommon for Mahalo Made to sell out just hours after opening.

La and her crew make all the syrups themselves from fresh, organic fruit, so nothing is pre-packaged or made from artificial ingredients. And there’s an extra ingredient that harkens back to her brand’s name. “Everything made out of gratitude,” La said of the reason she named her brand Mahalo Made. “That’s the closest translation we have in English to the Hawaiian word ‘Mahalo.’”

Verde Valley Habitat for Humanity

Habitat for Humanity was founded with the vision of building a world where no one struggles with housing insecurity. Verde Valley Habitat for Humanity (VVFH) is bringing that mission to the Northern Arizona communities of Sedona, Clarkdale, Camp Verde, Rimrock and Cornville.

Amid the vacation rentals and second homes in this region are people struggling to find affordable housing. Veterans, seniors and low-income families are most at-risk. As Executive Director Tania Simms put it, “Just because someone has a low income, doesn’t mean they shouldn’t have a chance to be a homeowner.”

Like all Habitat for Humanity affiliates, Verde Valley Habitat builds homes for those in need. VVFH’s partnership with OneAZ has been crucial to getting some

of these projects off the ground. It started with securing funding for a triplex in Sedona. “We wouldn’t have been able to build those three homes at one time if it wasn’t for the partnership and relationship,” said Simms. The first residents in that new development moved in within months of it being completed in June 2020.

What makes the relationship with OneAZ different? For Simms, it’s the communication and partnership she’s formed with the OneAZ business banking team. “We have a personal relationship,” she said. “There’s a person we can go to, and not just a phone number to call.” Plus, Simms says the team knows the Verde Valley community and cares about improving lives of its residents. Simply put, Simms said, “I’m not sure that we would’ve been able to get some of the funding that we were asking for without that deeper communication.”



Investing in Your Community

At OneAZ, we strive to be a force for good in the communities we serve. Through the OneAZ Community Foundation, we're able to truly improve the lives of those in our community who need it most. Over 100 nonprofits across Arizona received grants from the foundation in 2021. The stories of these organizations are truly inspiring.



I Am You 360

A home is more than a roof over your head. Desiree Cook understands that for Arizona's at-risk youth, a home could mean the difference between a life of hardship and a bright future. Seven years ago, Desiree founded I am You 360 to provide vulnerable families in Tucson with basic healthcare products. Last year, the organization expanded its mission to help provide at-risk youth with housing.

In August, I Am You 360 cut the ribbon on a safe-housing complex for 10 young people who were either homeless or aging out of the foster care system. These studio units were newly refurbished and fully furnished, and OneAZ helped stock them with basics that anyone moving into a new home would need. "We're doing the hard work of digging deep, so the kiddos who we

serve can be healed, restored and have a sense that the community is investing in them," said Desiree.

Having a place to call home is just the beginning of a new life for these youth. It will allow them to obtain gainful employment, pursue their education and give back to the community through their own charitable work.

I Am You 360 also continues to grow so it can help even more people in Tucson. They recently broke ground on another safe-housing project. This one will be a community of tiny homes that will provide another 10 youths with secure housing and OneAZ is helping to sponsor one of those homes. "OneAZ has been instrumental on both projects," Desiree said. "It's so inspiring to see how we're better together."


Camelot Therapeutic Horsemanship

The horse is a powerful symbol in the West. It's an emblem of freedom and strength. Camelot Therapeutic Horsemanship in Scottsdale is transforming those metaphors into reality.

The mission of Camelot Therapeutic Horsemanship is to improve the quality of life for children and adults with disabilities through programs of horsemanship and outdoor education. The lessons of horsemanship provide children with special needs important life skills that they can take with them into their everyday lives. In other words, the instructors and leaders at Camelot are leading children with physical disabilities to lives of freedom and self-fulfillment. "I have heard throughout the years that what Camelot means to them

personally is an opportunity to not sit on the sidelines, to be involved, to learn," said Executive Director Mary Hadsell.

Students at Camelot receive one-on-one instruction in all facets of horsemanship: from riding and driving to grooming and veterinary care, and more. With these skills, students develop strength, balance, and coordination. Most importantly, they acquire self-esteem. "Riding and connecting with an animal is a lot of hard work and it takes patience, and it's something that happens over a long period of time," Hadsell explained. "I've seen time and time again when that 'a-ha' moment happens, when they get it, that's a moment when lives are forever changed."



A Voice for the Community

In 2021, the OneAZ Community Foundation provided \$300,000 in grants to nonprofits throughout Arizona. This marks a record-breaking year in giving for the Foundation. We are grateful to our members, who largely fund the Foundation through their debit card swipes. Each time a member swipes their card, we donate one-cent to the Foundation. In 2021, members swiped their cards 27.5 million times, amounting to \$275,479 in donations to the OneAZ Community Foundation.

Together is Better Grants

Last year, the OneAZ Community Foundation launched the Together is Better grant program. Together is Better grants are awarded bimonthly in amounts ranging from \$3,000 to \$5,000.

In celebration of our 70th anniversary, the OneAZ Community Foundation provided an additional \$70,000 in grant funding that was distributed to 18 nonprofit organizations across Arizona.

Your Supervisory Committee is appointed by the Board of Directors and is responsible for ensuring that the assets of OneAZ Credit Union are safeguarded; an independent audit is performed annually; account balances of the membership are verified; and appropriate policies and procedures exist to ensure compliance with management's objectives and regulatory requirements. These responsibilities are accomplished through regular meetings with the Board of Directors, credit union management and staff, Risk Management/Internal Audit, external auditors, and regulators to review the credit union's activities.

We wish to express our appreciation to the Board of Directors, management and staff for their continued cooperation, compliance and dedication to the success of OneAZ Credit Union.

As of September 2021, the Arizona Department of Insurance and Financial Institutions and the National Credit Union Administration jointly completed their annual regulatory examination. In addition, the Committee independently selects a certified public accounting firm to perform an opinion on the credit union's financial statements.

The Supervisory Committee has reviewed and discussed the financial statements in the annual report. The Committee concludes that OneAZ Credit Union remains compliant with financial and operational internal controls and applicable regulatory requirements. We wish to express our appreciation to the Board of Directors, management and staff for their continued cooperation, compliance and dedication to the success of OneAZ Credit Union.


Treasurer's Report

As Treasurer of the OneAZ Credit Union Board of Directors, I am proud to report that OneAZ continues to be a strong, stable, and secure financial institution. In 2021, OneAZ experienced record growth in membership, which is a direct result of our associates' dedication to improving the lives of our members.

Assets grew by 16.7% to reach \$3.04 billion, and member loan growth reached \$1.45 billion. OneAZ's capital strength of 7.78% exceeds the National Credit Union Administration (NCUA) well capitalized threshold of 7.00%.
